## Introduction


This report serves to provide a summary of Nur Insan's Qurban 3 in 1 campaign for the year 2023. Our Qurban rites were carried out from 29<sup>th</sup> June 2023 to 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2023 in 12 different countries. Qurban is the main event of Eidul Adha, a significant Islamic festival celebrated by Muslims worldwide, where livestock is sacrificed so that the meat can be distributed among the needy and the less fortunate.

The sacrifices commenced in the early morning of 29<sup>th</sup> June 2023. Through careful coordination, we exhausted all efforts to ensure that each and every Qurban that had been entrusted to us was fulfilled correctly and responsibly, with proper facilities and manpower to assist in the process.






#### Total Ibadah Qurban 3 in 1, 2023

#### **Preparation and Planning**

Meticulous planning and preparations had been undertaken well in advance, such as confirming the supply of sacrificial animals that adhered to the required Islamic guidelines, ensuring that their well-being in terms of health and hygiene is observed, confirming the details of Qurban participants and assigning each name to the respective animals, and making arrangements for the expedition teams to Lombok and Bangladesh.

#### **Sacrifice Process**

On the day of Eidul Adha, the sacrificial animals were brought to the designated area, where trained personnel executed the sacrifices abiding by the religious guidelines. The process was conducted with the utmost respect and compassion towards the animals, ensuring a quick and humane sacrifice.



Out of the total amount collected, 70% was used to purchase the sacrificial animals in the selected countries. The meat from the sacrifices Qurban has been distributed among the underprivileged families in each respective country.


Waqaf

Evidently, this has helped to spread joy and foster a sense of togetherness as we fulfil the religious practice of sharing with those in need.

# Beneficiary Spotlight - Bangladesh

Mr Moqbuul and his wife grew up in Sreenagar, Bangladesh since they were small. The village they reside in is in destitute condition, with electricity cutting off on an average of 8 times every day. In the summer, they struggle with the scorching sun and boiling temperatures indoors. In rainy seasons, they battle with layers of mud surrounding their house and covering the streets.

Due to illness, Mr Moqbuul is missing most of his toes, rendering him unable to walk long distances and carry out strenuous activities. As a result, he can no longer work and provide for himself and his wife. Thus, his wife had to step up and become the sole breadwinner for their family.

Mr Moqbuul says that everyday, he is uncertain on whether or not there will be food. As the Malay saying goes, "Kais pagi makan pagi kais petang makan petang," which means that they make just enough from their work in the morning to have their morning meal, and make just enough from the evening work to sustain themselves for the evening.







Mr Nashhoon left his birthplace 18 years ago with his wife to find more work opportunities in the city. However, they have been living a life of hardship and strife ever since. Currently, Mr Nashhoon is working as a Tuktuk Driver while actively searching for additional work wherever he can to sustain himself and his wife. Their children are married and have moved out of their rusty aluminium house.

The past few weeks have been particularly difficult, according to Mr Nashhoon. With the city's current temperature fluctuating between 39°C and 40°C, it has become extremely hot and challenging to work during the day. He only has a small fan that he shares with his wife.

When presented with the Qurban meat and food, he profusely expressed his gratitude and wishes for all who have contributed to this act of giving to be blessed with abundant goodness and rewards.

Mr Suruaddin was from the outskirts of town and he had come to Dhaka for work. Unfortunately, he was not able to secure a roof over his head for a period of time. It was only recently when a kind individual had offered his small hut for him to live in.

At 44 years old, Mr Suruaddin currently does not have a permanent job. He has to keep hunting for work anywhere he could find in order to survive. On days where there is no work, he could only hope for some generosity from the people, which hardly ever comes by.

He was delightfully surprised to have our team come and visit him. He sends his thanks to everyone, from the distributors, to the suppliers and the kind donors.





## Beneficiary Spotlight - Lombok, Indonesia



Mr Habibi, aged 24, resides in a two-room, four-by-five-metre home together with his eight siblings. After losing his father a year and a half ago, his mother decided to abandon the family, leaving them all in a desperate situation. Her whereabouts remain a mystery to this day.

As the oldest among his siblings, the responsibility of being the head of the household falls on Mr Habibi. However, due to the aftermath of the 2018 earthquake and the Covid-19 recession, he has trouble finding employment in Lombok. Currently, he has to rely a lot on the ihsan of his neighbours and other villagers.

His own doubts in his siblings' ability to care for themselves or to further their studies have proven to be the biggest obstacle for him to leave Lombok in search of work and have any hopes of improving his family's position.

Our team distributed the Qurban meat and dry rations to the family and encouraged Mr Habibi to take the step forward and have faith in Allah SWT's protection and blessings through efforts to better their own situation.



Mr Mahyudin, 67, resides in an area of Lombok called Moncok Telaga Mas. He is one of the many local seniors who benefit from this year's Nur Insan 3-in-1 Qurban project.

Mr Mahyudin shares a small house with five other families, including his children and grandchildren. Before retiring this year, he worked as a livestock farmer and a tree cutter to support his family.

He had lost his right eye due to an accident, and now his left eye has been found to have cataracts. Along with other illnesses, his vision is now partially impaired.



We were surprised to learn that, even though he lives under one roof with his children and other family members, they do not share food or other necessities because of differences. His only means of sustenance is from the courtesy of his neighbours.

Despite all the heartbreaking accounts we heard from Mr Mahyudin, the tears he shed was out of joy and gratefulness upon recounting the fact that he was able to perform Umrah during the month of Syawal this year, and upon receiving the kind gesture in the form of food packs and dry rations.

His story is an inspiration for all of us to never lose hope in Allah SWT, no matter what condition we find ourselves in.



Mdm Basiah, who is known as Inak (Mother) in her village was abandoned by her children to live alone in a small home in Moncok Telaga Mas, Lombok.

She collects empty plastic bottles to make ends meet. It takes a hard work for 4-5 days to fill up her gunny sack, which she sells to a rubbish collector for IDR 15,000 (\$1.35).

Through her grit and determination, she managed to save enough money for the past 15 years to be

able to perform Umrah during Syawal this year.

She also attends a Quran recitation class every afternoon with fellow villagers of all ages. She is adamant that everyone has a responsibility to pursue knowledge in order to find comfort in life.

Amazingly resilient despite all of her setbacks, she is a role model for everyone to consider and draw inspiration from. For all her patience and strife through the difficulties in this Dunya, we believe that many doors have been opened to welcome her in Jannah. We pray that Allah SWT grants her infinite blessings in both worlds.
